## TEACHING PHILOSOPHY

In a rapidly changing world, traditional teaching of language, i.e., teacher-based approach, is no longer effective. Thus, preparing students with the 21st century skills requires using innovative and effective teaching methods as employers nowadays look for graduates who have soft skills, such as communication, problem-solving, critical thinking, and creativity. Developing such skills requires adopting teaching methods that focus on the learners (student-centered learning), not on the teachers. I believe that learning takes place through real-world activities, meaningful interaction, and communication.

My experiences of teaching (I have more than twelve years of university-level teaching experience in Saudi Arabia) and research have constituted my philosophy of teaching which is based on the idea that learners are the center of the learning process, and learning takes place inside and outside the classroom.

I believe that the goal of second/foreign language teaching is to develop the students' ability to communicate in the target language. To this end, I adopt the learner-centered approach to second language teaching, taking into my consideration that students have different needs and learning styles. Student-centered classrooms help them be actively engaged in using the target language. Learners' communicative competence can be promoted through using authentic activities where students negotiate the meaning rather than the form by themselves. Thus, my role is just a facilitator; I am not the only source of information because students can get information easily whenever they want.

Accordingly, I believe that there is not a single best way for teaching because students have different needs and different learning styles. Hence, a teacher should be eclectic, using what is known as differentiated instruction. Such teaching methods help students discover concepts and communicate ideas. For students to ultimately acquire a second/foreign language, they should be exposed to it naturally as they learn it in a context where it is not widely spoken.

During my Ph.D. study (I received the University Research Excellence Award for my Dissertation, 2019), I was also fortunate enough to have served as a Language Instructor (full-time). This experience, although it was very tough, other than the academic gains, has taught me how to be self-disciplined and how to efficiently achieve different tasks under pressure. Further, the coursework of the Ph.D., in particular the Computer Applications in Applied Linguistics course, has perfectly fostered my skills for designing and sharing learning materials online with students, and monitoring and assessing their progress, using different Learning Management Systems.

At the level of research, I believe that the primary purpose of research is to provide instructors, students, curriculum designers and administrators with evidence-based data that can be utilized inside the classroom. Thus, my current research interests focus on the L2 acquisition of English/Arabic. For example, I am working on a project (I have already collected data from over 100 learners) that investigates the size of vocabulary L2 learners of Arabic need to speak fluently. This quantitative research employs vocabulary size tests that will gauge the number of words Arabic L2 learners know. In a similar line of research, in my Ph.D. dissertation, which comprised two studies, I comparatively investigated the acquisition of the tense-aspect (TA) morphology in L2 Arabic and L2 English, with a particular reference to the Aspect Hypothesis. I designed three research instruments (a mixed-method approach) to collect data from 98 Arabic L2 learners. A meta-analyzed technique was used to investigate the L2 acquisition of the English tense-aspect system. My research interests also center around discourse analysis (written and spoken). For instance, two of my past articles were based on written corpora.
